DO YOU KNOW ILLINOIS?

The secretary of state of Illinois is the state librarian ex-officio. The state library and archives division under his jurisdiction contains much information concerning your state. Any questions which are of particular interest to readers and which are not covered in this series will be answered immediately. Address all communications: Edward J. Q. When were high schools first recognized as objects of financial aid from the state government?

A. 1934. One-third of the proceeds of the gasoline tax diverted for special aid to common and high schools from July 1, 1934 to March 1, 1935.

Q. What is the illiterate (10 years and over) population of Illinois?

A. 152,507 or 2.4 per cent according to the 1930 census. In 1920 the percentage was 2.4.

Q. By what nickname was Stephen A. Douglas known?

A. "The Little Giant." He was five feet, four inches in height.

Q. What college was founded in Chicago by Stephen A. Douglas?

A. Chicago University in 1857. It was discontinued during the Civil war.

Q. What was the famous "gun shoe campaign" (1865) in the 34th Senatorial district?

A. In an election succeeding the death of a member of the General Assembly from the 34th district the republicans through an elaborately secret campaign organized so that their voters cast their votes just before the polls closed and because of their apparent lack of interest in the earlier hours of the day the opposition was thrown off guard and a republican elected in a normally democratic district.

Q. What political expediency prompted the "gun shoe campaign"?

A. The republicans needed one vote in the general assembly to bring the reelection of John A. Logan to the U. S. Senate.

Q. On what ticket was John M. Palmer elected governor (1868)?

A. Republican.

Q. On what ticket was Palmer elected U. S. Senator (1890)?

A. Democratic. He had become a republican in the early days of that party and remained with it until 1872 when he supported Greeley against Grant and reentered the democratic ranks.

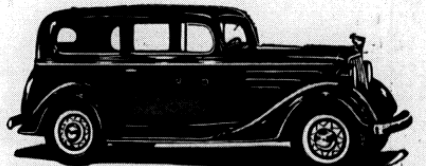
