DO YOU KNOW ILLINOIS? By EDWARD J. HUGHES, Secretary of State.

The secretary of state of Illinois is the state librarian ex-officio. The state library and archive division under his jurisdiction contains much information concerning your state. Any questions which are of particular interest to readers and which are not covered in this series will be answered immediately. Address all communications: Edward J. Hughes, Secretary of State, Public Information Department, Capitol, Springfield, Illinois.

Q. How often are general registrations of voters provided in Illinois? A. Once each two years before state elections. At these general registrations all voters must register anew on one or the other of the two days (either the Saturday preceding the Tuesday four weeks before the election, or the Tuesday before the election) in respect of former registrations.

Q. At what times other than the general registrations may a person register? A. In cities which have adopted the city elections act intermediate registrations are provided for on the Tuesday three weeks before an election.

Q. How may a voter absent from his voting district cast his vote? A. Under the Absent Voters law he may make applications for a ballot and by complying with the conditions specifying that for reasons of business or duties, etc., he shall be absent on the day of the election and having the application duly sworn to he may vote and have his ballot counted along with the other ballots.

Q. What is cumulative voting? A. In elections for the general assembly each voter has three votes for representative in his district. Under the cumulative plan the voter may distribute his three

votes in any way he sees fit. He may cast one for each of three candidates, or three for one candidate, or one and a half for each of two candidates, or two for one and one for another.

Q. At what election did women first enjoy complete equality with men in voting rights and what peculiar provision was made concerning ballots? A. The November election in 1920. Separate ballots were required for men and women. This latter provision was abolished by law in 1921.

Q. What is the total male population of Illinois? A. 3,873,487 (1930 census). Q. What is the total female population of Illinois? A. 3,757,197 (1930 census).

By whom were ballots provided prior to 1891? A. By the political parties involved at the election. A. At what expense are ballots at printed? A. At public expense since 1891.

Q. What elective state officials are required to give bond? A. Secretary of state, \$100,000; Auditor of Public Accounts, \$50,000; Treasurer, \$50,000; Attorney General, \$10,000; Superintendent of Public Instruction, \$25,000.
