Four accused of Forgery Held by Elgin Police  
Four Barrington men in the Tuesday morning at Elgin, 45 veterans club for as the men who passed bogus checks in this village.  
Whiting, accompanied by son, Elmer Whiting, daughter, Mrs. O. Whiting, and a 15-year-old girl, Eva Brown, had all their motor trip through Elgin, Illinois and Wisconsin naming it with money from bank vaults bank, to which Whiting had access, against him by the Elgin department Saturday night.  
The couple made Barrington for back end and patented seal across offering in part of their small purchases a price of \$2.50, which would require a little change. In case the check was signed "Whiting" which later turned out to be forged by the son, and payable to "Harr Miller," Elmer Whiting presented the check and introduced himself as Harry Miller. He endorsed his name on the three checks which were accepted in Barrington. These three were drawn on First National bank, as were which later appeared at the bank for payment—the others had been passed in nearby towns, at Franks, Cary.  
The quartet had driven to Chicago through Oak to Milwaukee, and then to Milwaukee. They returned to Illinois stopped at Barrington, Dundee, Cargis, Elgin, and other towns where they succeeded in cashing worthless checks, according to charges brought against them the Elgin police.  
On Saturday night, Whiting presented a check to W. A. Kiel, manager of a shoe store in Elgin. Mr. Kiel became suspicious and delayed Whiting while he called the police. Police Squad Finds Loot Stolen From Barrington Hill  
Louis Perez, 25-year-old son of a Barrington resident at Springfield, Ill., was held in Waukesha, Wis., for a charge of forgery, which was being held by the sheriff's office in Lake County. The Perez was arrested after deputy sheriff Elmer Whiting, and Chief of Police Clayton Tiffany of Mundelein found a quantity of loot in the Perez home in a building.  
Property found in the loot was identified as having been stolen from the Barrington Hills Country Club on July 3 and from the Joseph Reynolds estate in Mundelein on July 4.  
A variety of men's, women's and children's apparel, cigars and cigarettes, several revolvers and many other items were collected by the raiding officers.  
Robbers gained entrance to the locker room of the country club by breaking the glass in a door and then unfastening it. Lockers were raided by the thieves and clothing and suitcase taken. The robbers also broke into the show package of cigarettes.  
Entrance to the Reynolds place was made in the same manner and there the burglar took clothing, jewelry and other trinkets of value.  
Perez and his wife claim they had bought the goods from a peddler but the police believe it was stolen. It is thought that Perez acted as a "steer" for the robbers to sell their loot.
