For centuries the tulip has been looked upon as a wonder flower in many countries, but it has long been associated especially with the famous tulip fields of Holland. It has often been called "the flower that set a nation mad" because of the craze for these gay but simple blossoms which began in the Netherlands in 1601 and reached its highest point in 1637. During this period, when only two bulbs of the September Augustus were to be had, one was purchased for 4,000 florins, a new carriage, two horses and a complete set of harness, while the other was sold for 12 acres of land. This tulip mania reached such proportions that hundreds of families had become impoverished and the government was forced to interfere and put an end to the gambling in tulip bulbs.
