Modified Liquor Ordinance Passed at Board Meeting

Board Grants Vacations Monday to Monthly Employees Buy Park Seats

A modified liquor ordinance was presented Monday evening at the board meeting by Trustees John Schaefer and approved by the members.

The modification of the ordinance limits the number of taverns in Barrington to four. There will be at present and are being licensed in business no more than will be made. In the event business fails to renew its license the ordinance prevents the opening of a new place.

Upon a report of John Carr the board granted vacations monthly village employees to be equal to the best advantage of the employees themselves.

The police committee presented an offer of the Brandt Dairy one month of a \$117.50 bill credit when the police car was one of the dairy trucks had accident several months ago.

Order Six Beaches
Purchase of six benches to be placed on the beach Monday night was recommended by Trust H. D. A. Grobe, who handled the matter. The benches will be made of concrete and are being made by T. H. Hough street, and are to be six feet long and four feet high.

A license for the rental of building lot behind the passenger station was rejected in the Chicago and North Western railroad. Members of the board felt that the license were too binding upon the village for the actual benefit of the town.

Upon a motion of Trustees Nelson Phlego the board meeting to consider the insurance on the village hall passed at the last meeting. Now bids are to be called for a new rating for the building.
