Vehicle Traffic Heavy at Corner Main and Hough

State Men Count 1196 Cars and Trucks at Crossing in 24 Hours. A 24 hour check on traffic made by men from the Illinois Department of Public Highways at the Main and Hough street intersection Friday and Saturday revealed 11,196 cars and trucks crossed the junction. Counting was done for eight hours Friday from 7 a. m. to 11 a. m. and from 2 p. m. until 4 p. m. Saturday's count was for 16 consecutive hours from 7 a. m. until 11 p. m. Friday, 2263 cars and 655 trucks were tabulated for a total of 29,186 vehicles. The peak hour was between 5 and 6 p. m. with 466 cars and 87 trucks. Saturday, traffic ran heavy by the count and 4450 cars and 893 trucks were checked. Starting at 7 a. m. the number of combined vehicles increased from 270 to 521 between 11 and 12 a. m. After that a decrease was noticed until the count between the hours 3 and 4 p. m. was recorded. At that time 482 machines were counted. The peak hour Friday morning and each succeeding hour saw the traffic increase until a high total of 494 machines were counted between 4 and 5 p. m. Average 466 Per Hour.

World Eliminate Hazards

The second resolution handled the matter of providing pedestrians access to the park grounds without going around by way of Northside highway. It was suggested to extend a foot path from the north end of Harrison street west across the E. J. & E. railroad tracks along the top of the sewer right-of-way to the viaduct for Flint creek and north under the North Western tracks into the park. Another foot path was suggested west from the foot of Liberty street across the E. J. & E. tracks with electric lights and bells installed for a warning.
