Accident Must Be Reported Within 24 Hours, Ruling

New Law Shifts Responsibility From Police to Persons Involved

shifting the responsibility of reporting automobile accidents from police officers to the persons involved in the latest accident control measure passed by the legislature which is now in effect. The law makes it mandatory for persons involved in an accident resulting in personal injury or death to secure one of those blanks and forward with 24 hours a written report of the accident to the state highway department.

Police officers have been instructed to assist persons involved in an accident in filling out the blanks only when they are incapable of making reports themselves, thus placing the responsibility entirely upon the persons involved. However, and contrary to a file report constitute a misdemeanor, officers are instructed to report to the highway department if they are unable to obtain either or not a report has been made.

Property Owners Show in Making Payments on Taxes in Lake County

Only a small portion of the tax payers in Lake county who have received statements for the second installment of taxes have paid their bills so far, it has been reported this week by Allen J. Nelson, county treasurer.

The second installment of general taxes becomes delinquent September 1 due to an extension made by the legislature on payments.

Although more than 60 per cent of the 1934 taxes have been collected there are many small property owners in the rural sections that have not paid. To avoid a last minute rush to make payment before September 1 and also to avoid the possibility of penalties, Nelson suggests property owners make their payments in the next two weeks.
