Illinois Birth Rate in Substantial Gain Over Half-Year Period

According to a report issued by Frank Jirka, state health director, the birth rate for Illinois has made its first substantial gain in the last decade. For a six month period from January 1 to June 30, 56,922 babies were born. This represents an increase by 1000 over the same period last year. The director said the birth rate in Chicago showed an increase of 1257 over the 1934 period while downwards registered a decrease of 287 for the same period. The mortality rate also is running an unusually favorable course according to the report. June, with 4572 deaths recorded, had the lowest mortality of that month since 1932. It was also the lowest monthly mortality in the first six months of the year by 1498 deaths. The records show 44,459 deaths for the first half-year against 44,408 for the corresponding period of last year. Although this is an increase of 51 deaths there has been a steady decrease since January.
