No More Diagonal Parking on Hough and Main Street

New Statute Allows Only Parallel Parking on State Aid Roads
Old dogs may not learn a trick, but Barrington motorists are learning how to park in cars parallel to the curb on Main and Hough streets after having used the diagonal parking system these streets since 1913. A letter from the state highway department stating that this system of parking automobiles on these streets must be changed was received this week by Paul Perrell, superintendent of streets. After receipt of the letter, Perrell organized a painting crew to go over the streets and put the correct marking. Orange-colored parallel-to-the-curb lines were painted in and the diagonal markings obliterated with white paint. Hough and Main streets are the only downtown streets which come under the classification of state highways or state roads; consequently they are the only streets on which diagonal parking is prohibited under the statute converting the regulation which was passed at the last session of the legislature. A village ordinance on parking and traffic regulations, conforming with the new statute, is being worked out by John Dasek, John Carroll and Rudolph Koss, members of the village ordinance committee.
