Parking Signs Are Being Installed on Main and Hough Streets This Week

Engineering Firm Offers to Settle Claim for \$5000

Village Trustees Need \$5500 in Cash Before First of Year

Signs are being installed on Hough and Main streets this week notifying motorists of new parking regulations on those streets.

Shir, Buryman, Peterson and Shub, former village attorneys, through their attorney, George Potter, offered a compromise settlement of \$5000 to the village board Monday night.

The proposition offered contains several clauses stipulating time when payment is to be made, if made prior to October 31 the figure would be \$5000; after December 31 and prior to January 31, 1938 it would be \$5500; prior to February 28, 1938 it would be \$6000 and after that time it would be \$7000.

The most vexing obstacle for the trustees is that of raising the money. A sum of \$5500 must be loaned shortly if they are to effect a saving for Barrington. What method will be used to obtain funds is not known but a committee meeting this week may result in a solution.

The additional \$3500 needed is for Benjamin Langworthy, former village attorney, who is suing against the village. Langworthy filed the board met a compromise figure with Langworthy to avoid litigation. He offered to settle his claim for \$3500 if paid before the end of the year. He intends to have judgment returned against the village for \$6000 if settlement is not made.

Both agreements contain the stipulation that payment is meant as cash. With that prospect in mind trustees are anxious to get the money and not forfeit the purpose of complying with an expensive litigation.

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
