Decline Recorded for Fatalities in County This Year

With the advent of fall weather and summer residents of Lake county returning to their homes, a review of the year's fatalities at the lakes and on the highways reveals a comparative standard of safety and accident prevention.

There were 15 drownings at the 52 lakes in the county during the spring and summer months it was revealed by this county coroner's office this week.

Drownings recorded during the past seven years are as follows: 1929, 21; 1930, 18; 1931, 21; 1932, 21; 1933, 12; 1934, 29 and 1935, 15.

Vigilant patrolling of county and state roads by deputy sher-

iffs and state highway police resulted in a material drop in deaths due to auto accidents. Starting at the time Lake county Sheriff L. A. Doolittle took office last December there have been 21 fatalities in the county outside of Waukegan.

Five persons died from auto injuries in Waukegan making a total of 26 for the county at the present time. Last year 47 deaths were recorded in the county and Waukegan at this time.

The number of accidents reported in the county with no fatalities has been materially decreased according to reports from the state and sheriff office. Fatalities for the past six years and for this year to-date are: 1929, 52; 1930, 58; 1931, 36; 1932, 40; 1933, 32; 1934, 36; 1935, 26.

Six of the deaths recorded this year have occurred at railroad crossings according to Lake county Coroner J. L. Taylor.

Suburban Building for August Continues With High Increase Over 1934

The month of August, in a survey compiled by a Chicago securities company of new building in the Chicago suburban region, appears as the sixth in succession in the procession of million dollar months which began in March.
