## Regular Movies As Educational Work Shown at School

Picture Furnish Classes a Broader Instructional Viewpoint

A wide scope of educational picture is being inaugurated at the public school this year with the advent of regular scheduled picture shows. These movies will portray various operations, chemical and physical, of instructive topics.

Barrington public school has joined the Visual Aids Society sponsored by the University of Illinois. Each member school purchases a film and pays a regular charge on other films. These films are kept at Champaign and are loaned under schedule to schools.

"Pyro-making" is the title of a film purchased by the local school. This film shows dependence of the atom oxygen. It illustrates proper combination of fuels with maximum heat from fuel.

Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of each week the picture are shown as part of regular class work. The Common Cold, "Cooking of the Potato," "Digging Up the Past," "Simple Machines" and "Steps of American History," are being shown this month.

Superior supervisors from the Northwest conference will meet the week and plans for a music festival will be discussed.
