

**Methodist Church to Introduce New Hymnal at Rally Day Services**

An interesting feature of Rally Day services at 10:45 Sunday morning in the Methodist church will be introduction and use of a new Methodist hymnal. The present hymnal has been in use for 20 years. The new hymnal, authorized by the last General Conference meeting in Atlantic City in 1928, has been over two years in completion. In the new book all stanzas of hymns are within the music score. In the old hymnal all stanzas, except the first, were printed below the music. All better known and loved hymns from the old book have been retained and a few unused and obsolete ones were eliminated. Over 200 new "singable" hymns have been added.

**Construction on Sewer Must Start by December 1**  
C. H. Bauer, PWA Head, Tells Mayor Men Must Be Employed Soon  
A letter was received this week by Earl H. Hix, village president, from the office of C. H. Bauer, PWA official, stating that construction work must be started on sewer projects by December 1. The sewer project was most important of all sewer work to get to work as soon as possible. Councilor, Oliver, Townsend and plain, village engineers, have indicated the right way for the sewer cover from the treatment plant to the Fox river. They considered this information to village board Monday night. A. L. Robertson was asked to give out appraising the land through which the sewer line will run. At present the tile is planned to go between the Chicago and North branches of the Fox river. The line is to be the intersection of Flat track and then to follow the creek bed to the Fox river. A strip of land varying from 25 to 70 feet wide is needed as a right-of-way. Mr. Robertson, trustees John Baker, Rudolph Koehler and D. E. Maloney, village attorney, made a trip through the land Wednesday and are appraising the value. The appraisals will be turned over to the board for approval. A resolution containing items and was prepared at the last meeting was approved and will be forwarded to PWA headquarters. A committee is to meet this week with village officials and discuss the sewer project. The sewer project is to be an hour for skilled, 40c for unskilled and 50c for unskilled. Various types of labor will be paid on a scale relative to the schedule. Village engineers will have plans ready this week on the sewer treatment plant and remaining details will be ready next week.  
**Keep Informed on Your Government, Sexton Challenges**  
Do not complain about your government if you do not know who your representatives are. Major Trevor Sexton challenged more than 200 members of the Barrington Legion and Auxiliary Units holding a joint installation at St. Anne's school last Thursday evening. Major Sexton called for any individuals who could name the representatives of the Legion and Auxiliary units and assembly. After receiving no response he declared: "You are the law, your elective officers are your chosen representatives. You should write them if you are not satisfied with their expenditure of your money. Unless you keep in touch with your government and inform on what it is doing, you have no just basis for complaint. Major Trevor delivered an impressive address on Americanism and the duties of citizenship. He said too much worry is being wasted on communism, adding that communism is all right—for Russia. It was one of the earliest concepts of government. Ancient tribes banded together shared food and fought against common enemies for preservation. However, Americanism is a 1400 year more modern concept of government than communism. Following installation of Legion and Auxiliary officers, the Country Auxiliary Glee club entertained the group with several songs. Leon Lovendahl and Herbert Koehler were on the program with an accordion and piano and refreshments completed the program. Public Service Employees Tree Experts to Work on Trees in Village  
The Davy Tree Trimming company, under contract with the Public Service company, has a crew of men engaged in working on trees throughout the village. The branches will be trimmed away from light wires and all trees are to be protected as to their soundness. Felling trees and branches require constant attention. The work is expected to continue for several months before the crew will cover the entire village.
