Union 'Demands' Higher Wage Rate on Sewer Project

Labor conditions in Barrington for the forthcoming PWA sewer project have not been definitely settled. At a meeting Thursday night with C. H. Miller, union agent, village officials were unable to reach a satisfactory settlement. Earl Hatje, village president; John Carroll, H. D. A. Grebo and John Blanke, village trustees, comprising a committee negotiating an adjustment.

Larger Payroll Impossible Under Approved PWA Plan

According to his plan every man working on the job would have to join the union. Initiation fees cost \$10, payable in 55 installments over two weeks. Also there would be a hold which would amount to \$2 a month. The committee in charge has pointed out that in the original plan for the Miller project there was an increase of over \$40,000 for labor if the union rate were paid. According to rules set down by the PWA, adjustments in the union are determined on all projects by the prevailing rate in the community receiving the job.

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
