

Top Hat Begins Three-Day Run at Catlow Tonight

Midnight Show of 'Werewolf of London' is Halloween Special

Much ado is being made over 'Top Hat' which begins its three-day showing at the Catlow Theatre tonight. Critics and fans are emphatic that it is a picture over which much ado should be made, hailing it as the brightest, happiest and most tuneful of all the Fred Astaire-Rogers films. For sheer entertainment, the kind that lifts the spirits to a pitch of effervescence, one will wait long to experience the equal.

Tonight, after the two early evening screenings of 'Top Hat' the Catlow is offering a lark for Halloween revelers. It is a midnight showing of 'The Werewolf of London,' and is calculated to top the celebration of all who are inclined to be pranksy as the vigil of All Saint's day draws to its close. The midnight show will begin at 11:15 and will be preceded by appropriate short subjects.

The Sunday-Monday bill is really a two-feature program, although one of the items is but ten minutes in length. The whole world follows the ups and downs of this unusual brood of babies, and this slant on their daily life will give a more intimate picture than possible through any other medium. Classified Ads Bring Results

Automobile Forms for Registration Being Distributed

Secretary of State E. Hughes Urges Buying Licenses Immediately

Secretary of State Edward J. Hughes this week began distribution of registration forms for 1936 Illinois automobile licenses. First shipment of application blanks were made to city and county clerks, sheriffs, police stations, newspapers and various motor clubs throughout the state, from which places they will be available to car owners.

By special arrangements with oil companies, license forms will be distributed also from filling stations and garages in cities and along various state highways.

The law requires car owners to display 1936 license plates January 1, and according to Secretary Hughes, the motor vehicle act makes no provision for any day of grace.

In order to expedite early delivery of license plates Secretary Hughes urged motorists to fill out application forms immediately upon receipt, mailing them to his office in Springfield promptly notarized, and accompanied by correct fees either in the form of certified check, draft or money order. Postage stamps are not permitted, Mr. Hughes stated.

Car owners desiring reassignment of their 1935 numbers must make request and file their application before December 31. Those re-registering the same car should renew their 1935 registration card along with the application for their new plate.

Motorists registering new cars will be required to furnish the secretary of state's office with a bill of sale as an official record for the motor vehicle department. They must also apply for a certificate of title, owners whose cars are not registered in Illinois are not required to make application for a new certificate of title. A certificate of title is good for the life of the car when in the original owner's possession.

Applicants for plates for newly acquired used cars must furnish evidence of ownership in the form of a properly endorsed certificate of title.

Plates this year will cost less than heretofore. Following is a schedule of new fees: \$8 plates reduced to \$6.50; \$12 plates reduced to \$10.50; \$20 plates reduced to \$17; \$20 plates reduced to \$12; \$20 motorcycle fees reduced from \$14 to \$12.

The new license plates now in the process of production will be black with white numerals.

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North Western Extends Popular Meal Service

Quick acceptance by the public of "money-saving" ideas introduced on Chicago and North Western Railway coaches a short time ago—low priced meals served from a desirable, portable service and free pillows—has enabled that road to extend this service, effective Wednesday (Oct. 30) to the "Core King Limited" running from Chicago to Omaha—St. Louis City and the "Ashland Limited" between Chicago and Ashland, Wis.

It started as an experiment by the North Western—Union Pacific on their transcontinental "Los Angeles Limited," this coach meal plan, served by dining car chefs and waiters from a steam-table in the coach, on the basis of 30 cents a day to passengers for breakfast, luncheon, and dinner. It has since been installed on other cross-country trains—the "Columbian," the "Pacific Limited," the "Fortyqu Limited," and the "Mountain Bluebird."

Hot breakfast for 25 cents, luncheons for 30 and dinners for 35 have made an instant hit with travelers, according to K. Thompson, passenger traffic manager of the North Western, while coaches specially assigned to the coaches furnishing free pillow service to those who want it do much to keep the car clean and comfortable for patrons.—Adv.

Science Lecturer Stresses Need of Spiritual Light

Judge Samuel Green Spoke at School Auditorium Tuesday

The lecturer was introduced by Mrs. Mary G. Ellis. Judge Green spoke in part as follows: "The desire for light is universal. According to the records of the book of Genesis, God's object is 'Let there be light.' The fulfillment of this spiritual light as provided by deity, creation is made manifest to the living eye, as is indicated in the following statement from the Christian Science textbook: 'Light and Health with Key to the Scriptures' by Mary Baker Eddy, Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, Oct. 1914: 'God is Light. God is the Light of Day, and the darkness He created in the evening and morning were the first day. The darkness was not created, but being both spiritual and material are answered in this passage, though solar beams are not yet clouded in the result of creation still there is light. This light is not from the sun nor from candle flame, but is the revival of Truth and of spiritual life. This also shows that there is a place where God's light is, and it is immediately and are over-ruled. Was not this revelation a sign of a creation?'"

"Thus, in clear, confident, confident words, the student of Christian Science is invited to see creation as spiritual and not material, as the spiritual light that pervades the teachings of Christian Science. Thinking through from its limited confines of materiality to the boundless expanse of spiritual light. 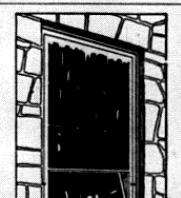
