Village Trustees Vote Bond Issue Totalling \$21,000

Payment of Outstanding Old Claims to Effect Cash Savings

A resolution for a general bond issue of \$21,000 was accepted by the village trustees at a special meeting Friday evening. The bonds are to be sold prior to 1937, will be paid from proceeds of the sale of bonds. A special fund saving will result from the payment of the largest amount of old debts charged against the village board has been to make a compromise between the construction of the present sewer system, platting of subdivisions, legal expenses, the inspection unit and other work. Benjamin Langworth offered a claim for judgment amounting to \$6000. By agreement of compromise he agreed to accept \$1200 as a cash settlement. On next January 1 as a result of the compromise, the village board had filed notice of a compromise of \$12500 in engineering work. At a meeting held early in the month they offered to settle the debt. A representative of the engineering firm met with the village president, and P. H. Maloney, village attorney and agreed to settle for \$5000 cash. If other firms are paid before the end of next year the compromise agreement will become void with the village facing higher claims and possible litigation. The miscellaneous claims outstanding amount for the additional \$10000. The savings to be derived from the large claims are important from an economic point of view. The figures based on the settlement of the law will be reported later than one mill.
