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claims, which were based largely on contracts let for finishing the rooms.

The county auditors notified the school board in July that the general fund practice had been abolished, and that the money on hand, nearly \$70,000, was to be turned over to the educational fund, leaving the building account \$30,000 short.

With a large surplus in the educational fund, the board of education has proposed a plan whereby a \$15,000 reduction in next year's levy will be made and also calling for similar reductions of \$10,000 each in the next two succeeding years. Action to reduce next year's levy has already been taken by E. S. Smith, superintendent of schools, who has written county clerks asking for necessary information. It is possible by resolution to make a reduction in the levy but not an increase, consequently bond issue is necessary to meet the claims.

By reducing the levy for educational purposes, the issuance of bonds would be offset, the increase being met with a reduction.
