

The Ritz Brothers Headline Week-End Feature at Catlow

"Kentucky Moonshine" Here
Sun-Mon.; "Joy of
Living" Billed

"There's Always a Woman," many comedy co-starring Joan Blondell and Melvyn Douglas at the Catlow theatre Saturday, won from seasoned film critics the most laudatory comments ever heard in Hollywood.

"His 'Tins Man' and 'Awful Truth' thrown into one," Leo Townsends, of Modern Screen, reported.

Hilarious hillbillies, like the kind that romp through "L'il Abner," "Barney Google" and "The Mountain Boys" comedies, bring loads of fun to the Catlow when "Kentucky Moonshine" opens on Sunday. The Ritz Brothers are starred in the film as mountaineers. The look hillbilly, they talk hillbilly, but don't let the whippersnoots say it's the Ritzes daffier than ever.

Double featured with "Mr. Moto Takes a Chance" on Tuesday is "Go Chase Yourself," starring Joe Penner, and featuring Lucille Ball and Richard Lane.

In one respect Irene Dunne's role in "Joy of Living," new musical comedy, is the easiest part she has ever portrayed on the screen.

That is because she impersonates a successful musical comedy actress in the picture—a character that mirrors her real life career. The incidents of the plot, of course, have no bearing on her life history.

The slender favorite starred on Broadway in such hits as "Irene" and "Show Boat," two of the most popular musicals New York has ever known. As a consequence, it wasn't at all difficult for her to be realistic in the picture, in which Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., appears, an unique type of tinsel romantic adventure.

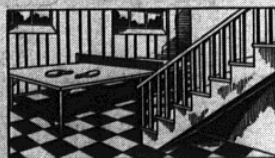
